SOCIO ECONOMIC ( CONDITIONS ) STATUS AND THE

JUVENILE DELINQUENCY IN SRI LANKA .

( A study done in the western province . )

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In the introductory chapter as John Dewy says " the felt difficulty" is described. As the questionaire and the interview techniques were used to measure the independent variables in the study , some effective measures of constructing questionaires and interview schedules are discussed in this chapter .

In the secound chapter , the various findings and theories of leading psychologists , anthropologists , and sociologists such as Cyril Burt , Michael Phillipson , Robert Park , Lynn MacDonald , T.P.Morris , Betty Spinley , Albert Cohen , D.J.Best , John Barron Mays , Michael Argyle , J.H.Bargot , Harriet C.W ilson , Robert Andry , A.S.Makarenko and others have been discussed .

The third chapter is devoted to discuss the major socio-economic factors, under four main headings, namely; cultural, material conomic, motivational and emotional. Under these four areas 25 factors have been selected for measurement. In this chapter, some important tables relevant to the juvenile delinquency problem in Sri Lanka, have been given, which are extracted from the administrative report (1974) of the Commissioner of Probation and Child Care.

In the 4th chapter, the details with regard to the selection of sample of 178 children and how the study was conducted are given. The english version of the questionaire is also included in this chapter.

The 5th cha-pter gives the analysis of data and the interpretation of results .

The last chapter has been devoted to discuss the remedial measures that have been taken in Sri Lanka and in other countries in relation to this problem , and some independent suggestions too have been included .

The sinhala version of the questionaire/interview schedule that was used in the study ; the summary of the answers or the data gathered ( in percentages ) and the list of references are given in the last part of the work .
